



## Holiday Music at St. Mark's Cathedral

## A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols • Sunday, December 16, 2018 • 4:00 pm

On Sunday December 16, 2018 at 4 pm, we will present *A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols* as sung at King's College Cambridge, England. Readers for the service will be parents of St. Mark's Boys and Girls Choir choristers and former St. Mark's Vestry Wardens. Music presented will include works of John Tavener, Boris Ord, Andrew Carter, David Willcocks, Richard Purvis and John Rutter.

The Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was first held on Christmas Eve 1918 at King's College Chapel. It was planned by Eric Milner-White, who at the age of thirty-four had just been appointed Dean of King's College Chapel after experience as an army chaplain which had convinced him that the Church of England needed more imaginative worship. (Milner-White devised the College's Advent Carol Service in 1934, and was a liturgical pioneer and authority during his twenty two years as Dean of York.) The music was then directed by Arthur Henry Mann, Organist 1876–1929.

A revision of the Order of Service was made in 1919, involving rearrangement of the lessons, and from that date the service has always begun with the hymn 'Once in royal David's city.'

The backbone of the service, which is the lessons and the prayers, has remained virtually unchanged. The original service was, in fact, adapted from an Order drawn up by E.W. Benson, later Archbishop of Canterbury, for use in the wooden shed, which then served as his cathedral in Truro, at 10 pm on Christmas Eve 1880.

A.C. Benson recalled: 'My father arranged from ancient sources a little service for Christmas Eve – nine carols and nine tiny lessons, which were read by various officers of the Church, beginning with a chorister, and ending, through the different grades, with the Bishop.' The suggestion had come from G.H.S. Walpole, who later became Bishop of Edinburgh.

Almost immediately other churches adapted the service

for their own use. A wider frame began to grow when the service was first broadcast in 1928 and, with the exception of 1930, it has been broadcast annually on Christmas Eve.

Sometime in the early 1930's the BBC began broadcasting the service on overseas programs. Recordings of carols by Decca and EMI have also served to spread its fame. In these and other ways the service has become public property. From time to time the College receives copies of services held, for example, in the West Indies or the Far East and these show how widely the tradition has spread. The broadcasts, too, have become part of Christmas for many far from Cambridge. One correspondent writes that he heard the service in a tent on the foothills of Everest; another, in the desert. Many listen at home, busy about their own preparations for Christmas. Visitors from all over the world are heard to identify the Chapel as 'the place where the Carols are sung'. The service from King's College Chapel can be heard live here in Shreveport on Christmas Eve at 9:00 am on 89.9FM.

Wherever the service is heard and however it is adapted, whether the music is provided by choir or congregation, the pattern and strength of the service, as Dean Milner-White pointed out, derive from the lessons and not the music. 'The main theme is the development of the loving purposes of God...' seen 'through the windows and words of the Bible.' Local interests appear, as they do here, in the bidding prayer, and personal circumstances give point to different parts of the service. Many of those who took part in the first service must have recalled those killed in the Great War when it came to the famous passage 'all those who rejoice with us but on another shore and in a greater light.' The center of the service is still found by those who 'go in heart and mind, even unto Bethlehem' and who consent to follow where the story leads.

Please plan to join us for this special and truly beautiful Christmas tradition which is St. Mark's annual gift to the Shreveport community!

## Blessed Advent.

In the midst of my own thoughts and discernment about Christian discipleship, the following sermon was shared with me recently. I believe that it gives a compelling message about our discipleship, and I hope that it blesses you during this season of Advent preparation. Godspeed be with you, Alston.

The Reverend Todd Fitzgerald, Chaplain of St. Stephen's Episcopal School, Austin, Texas.

The Christian mystic, Meister Eckhart wrote about being a disciple of Jesus; about having a ready stance or attentive posture, "such vigilant people are alert and on the watch for the Lord, they look to see if he is not by chance concealed in what befalls them. So we too should consciously look out for the Lord in all things. This demands much effort, and must cost us all that our senses and faculties are capable of..."

We all know that church membership is relatively easy – for sure membership includes frustrations, annoyances, and difficult people. Discipleship, however, this is altogether a different matter. Discipleship, that daily effort to live in such a way that allows Jesus Christ to come through our lives, to be made manifest in our speech, action, and thoughts, this is far more difficult. Discipleship requires sacrifice, commitment, and continual learning. Discipleship is costly, it "costs us all that our senses and faculties are capable of..."

We are called to discipleship not membership. Like the disciples in the gospel, we are called by God, sent out with others, promised that we will be given authority, and instructed to be faithful to the task.

St. Teresa of Avila wrote that Christian discipleship is about "...eternal love taking up residence in your heart...which enables you to do some very ordinary things a bit better." St. Teresa begins her explanation of the call of the disciple by describing the disciple's heart.

Discipleship begins with genuine prayer, opening one's heart to the presence of God. Receiving Christ in meditation, in worship, in the words of scriptures, enables us to do ordinary things a bit better. Because of the love of God in our hearts, we might be more generous, less impatient, slower to anger, and quicker to compassion. So discipleship is learning to pray, learning intimacy with Jesus Christ in prayer, and learning to live in the light of relationship.

Discipleship is not about personal spiritual growth or individual fulfillment. Students and faculty in my community often complain about having to attend chapel or take Theology classes. "I can find spirituality on my own," they say. Spirituality may be a form of individual fulfillment, but it is not discipleship. Discipleship is about being sent with others to a specific place. The disciples were sent out two by two, which points to the fact that we need brothers and sisters, friends in Christ, to do what we are called to do. And what we are called to do, it seems, is to go to a specific place, and likely one not of our choosing. Disciples are sent to those places in the world, among certain people in the world where Jesus dwells and waits to partner with us.

Jesus ordered the first disciples to take nothing for their journey save a walking stick. "You will be given authority" he promises, you will be given the grace you need to do what needs to be done. St. Paul, the greatest among the Christian disciples, might be our model for how we receive authority to be faithful disciples. Paul's guidance is liberating and reassuring – disciples need not be perfect, righteous, determined . . . only humble and faithful. Paul tells us, "I am content with weaknesses, hardships . . . for the power of Christ is made perfect in weakness." When we experience our own failures in discipleship, there we find occasions for Christ to be present; "whenever I am weak, then I am strong."

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One of the greatest Christian disciples in America was Thomas Merton. Trappist monk who lived in the religious community of Abbey of Gethsemane in Kentucky. Merton wrote intensively about following Jesus. Despite years in the monastery, hours and hours in chapel, spiritual direction and Bible study, Merton admitted his own struggles to be a faithful disciple.

My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end. Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think that I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. And I hope that I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road through I may know nothing about it. Therefore I will trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone.

In the winter of 2012, I knew that I was in a season of discernment. Because of my experience and skills, I expected God would guide me to an Episcopal School where I could lead worship, teach theology, and live in community. I did not expect, however, that God would send me back to Austin, Texas where I had spent 7 years in ministry. As I interviewed during those Winter months, what began to emerge was head Chaplain role at St. Stephen's in Austin. Many of the responsibilities they identified as high priorities were roles to which I was well suited. Looking back now, after six years serving as their chaplain, I believe I was sent by God to St. Stephen's to partner with other disciples in God's mission to that place.

My fellow disciples, friends in Christ, be reassured: the desire for God, pleases God; the one who calls us and sends us, is ever with us; our weaknesses will be transformed by the power of Christ.

The way of discipleship is costly, it demands much, but it is the way to immeasurable joy.

Our SMCS Choir and Lower School Music classes are working on choral anthems and antiphons to sing for Family Chapels and the culminating celebration of Lessons and Carols. Indeed, we are actively and expectantly awaiting the Light of Love to be born again in our hearts this Christmas.





**December 1919** – St. Mark's at its prior location on Cotton Street experienced a fire that caused damage, which would be estimated in today's dollars

between 200 and 500 thousand dollars! A new roof had to be put on. During the reconstruction of the building, B'nai Zion Congregation offered their space for St. Mark's congregation to worship.

**December 1941** – With the entrance of the United States into World War II, and the growing awareness of Hitler's anti-



semitic program overseas, St. Mark's rector, the Rev. Dr. James Owens was asked to write an article for the Jewish Journal. He proceeded to point out that the Savior whose birthday the Christian world was preparing to celebrate was born to a Jewish mother and that the first to preach his message were his Jewish followers. Dr. Owens also stated, "Anti-Semitism is one of the most tragic forms

in which the Anti-Christian spirit reveals itself in the hearts of un-Christian men. The logical result is the totalitarian concentration camp." The editor of the Jewish Journal revealed his admiration for Dr. Owens as "one of the most outstanding Christian ministers in Shreveport."

December 1959 – The first midnight Christian service was celebrated in the current Cathedral by the Rev. Dr. Larry

Plumley. Holy Communion was celebrated. Hymns which were sung included: Fanfare for Christmas Day, Of the Father's Love Begotten, Christmas Day by Gustav Holst, I Wonder as I Wander, Song of Mary, In Quiet Joy, O Holy Night, Come Ye to Bethlehem, and Angels We Have Heard on High. The Nicene Creed was also sung in monotone.

**December 1983** – St. Mark's Day School held the first ever "Festival of Trees." The Times reported the entire school as being "transformed into a Christmas wonderland by means of children's art work and murals, 'theme' trees and decorators' showcases displaying novel gift suggestions."

**December 1996** – The Dedication and Blessing of the Ministry Center took place, presided over by the Rt. Rev. Robert Hargrove with the Very Rev. M.L. Agnew, Jr. and the Rev. Canon Jane Alexander assisting. Lunch was served in the new gymnasium afterward.
