EfM for Everyone

Our eleven person EfM (Education for Ministry) group just completed its 21st weekly seminar meeting for year one of the EfM program. Some describe the EfM program as a study in practical theology. We aren't training to be ordained ministers or biblical scholars, but learning to examine and live life each day through a theological lens of faith so when faced with making an ethical choice we may better answer the question "How do I know this is a faithful way?" This program acknowledges that as Christians each of us are called to minister to one another in Christ's name as we live our daily lives. How has EfM helped me in responding to this call to minister? EfM is helping me move towards a life of wholeness. EfM is also helping me assume responsibility for my spiritual maturity.

Spiritual wholeness, I think, means living life without spiritual judgment (as contrasted to spiritual belief and conviction) on the choices of others. Whether these be choices of individuals, a community or society at large. The easy path for me is to say that something or someone made a wrong choice and then just label that choice as not worthy of thought or further consideration. The EfM structure




creates an environment that encourages listening and hearing the perspective of others. This applies to the group and the bible readings we've encountered. Thus far, the biblical study portion of EfM has focused on the old testament (Genesis through 2 Kings and several

of the works of the Prophets). These books are replete with stories of violence against others, abusive and unequal treatment of woman and the display of baser human emotions and responses as an extension of their faith. The practices and ways of interacting in eighth and seventh century B.C. seem very out of place with how we live today and how we perceive God. This creates a sense of ambiguity in connecting to these Old Testament offerings. What do these offerings mean to me?

The first response to this is an observation. As a boy and young man, Jesus studied the same texts we are now reading in our first year of EfM. The Gospel from this past Sunday (Fifth Sunday after Epiphany) makes it clear that he did not come to abolish the Old Testament law, but to bring out the real meaning (Matthew 5:13-20).

As Alston put it, many Old Testament actors were focused on observing the externality of the Law of Moses without being transformed within by the Spirit of Law. As a first year EfM participant reading the entertaining but seemingly inconsistent Old Testament, I find we are still searching for the same thing that Jesus spoke about and lived out over 2,000 years ago – transformation of our hearts. Recognizing that we are reading and studying the same passages as Jesus did is immensely uplifting and empowering.

The other takeaway is that the search for God in the 7th century B.C. was just as important then as it is today. Like us, in many cases, the Old Testament characters fell victim to their own human weakness and looked to God for guidance. The Old Testament figures were simply trying to understand God and how God could bring meaning and purpose to their lives. At times, Old Testament authors characterized God's response as one of anger or vengeance or some other lesser reaction of human nature. Rather than dismiss this characterization, EfM helped me realize that the authors were human. And as such, the Old Testament authors were faced with the fundamental limitation of human speech when trying to describe God. Unlike us as modern Christians who have the benefit of the teachings of Jesus, those ancient authors really had no better way to imagine God than in the likeness of human beings. Whether it be a recitation of the seemingly archaic actions of the seventh century Israelites or a review of random 21st century twitter postings of ordinary U.S. citizens, understanding the perspective of the subject is critical to ministering to the person. Acknowledging this wholeness means listening to that person and their story.

In EfM our first efforts at really listening have been with each other. In listening, hearing, agreeing or disagreeing with each other, we are taking the first steps to minister. In our listening we are both ministering and being ministered to.

EfM is also helping me assume responsibility for my spiritual maturity. One condition of participating in the seminar is agreeing to be responsible for reading the materials and reflecting on how the reading amazes, bothers, confuses and delights each of us. For meaning to flow from the weekly meeting, each participant commits to proper preparation. By each of us agreeing to offer thoughtful responses, we are accepting responsibility for our own and each other's spiritual maturity. Each week a different person is responsible for leading the group worship time. The intentionality of these commitments and acceptance of individual and group responsibility helps bring an awareness of the daily need for of ministry. Each of us are already minsters. The question that EfM helps answer is whether we will be intentional or unintentional in that role.

St. Mark's EYC News

Something that has been a huge gift to EYC since this Fall has been the addition of our young adult Mentor Team which meets with the Cathedral youth every Sunday at the Ministry

Center. I am probably starting to sound like a broken record in mentioning that, but simply put, I *cannot* thank them enough. Erin, Andrew, Laura, and Carson, all who attend St. Mark's and have committed to serving on our youth team for a year, have

been a crucial part of this important ministry.

As you very well may know, churches, especially in this day and age, are constantly asking the question to themselves, "How do we get more young folks?" Many who minister in that field will say that one size does not fit all. And this is true. One strategy will work for every church setting. However, I think there is one thing that does "work", and that is keeping Jesus Christ at the center of all we do, and recognizing that how God meets all of us through Jesus Christ, is the ultimate purpose for any ministry, youth or otherwise.

Around last June, I was browsing through any resource I could find

at the time about anything related to youth ministry, with hope of finding something that could be of service to what we do at St. Mark's. This is when I discovered *The Longer Haul*. It is a youth ministry podcast, with over a hundred episodes that can be accessed on Spotify, iTunes, or their website **thelongerhaul**. **com**. The podcast is hosted by youth ministers and they bring all kinds of different youth ministers as guests to talk about a wide variety of topics related to youth ministry, from countdown of best youth games to generational studies. No other resource, book, web article, etc. came to me that was nearly as interesting or inspiring as this podcast. I encourage people who have any deep interest in what the church does (whether in the area of youth ministry or not) to take a listen to it.

In one particular episode, a youth minister named Alan Smith is interviewed about his book *Let's Go: Creating and Sustaining a Thriving Youth Ministry*. It is an honest look at the essentials of what makes ministry strong. He spent a great deal of time talking about one chapter in the book which he titled *"It's not all about you."* It was his personal account of the course his ministry took that led him to the important realization that he could not do it *all by himself*. In his first couple of years of ministry, he wanted to be "big up front" and "organize everything". But he soon found there was no way he could do everything that he needed to get it done. "No *one* person" can do all that, he said. When I listened to this episode recently, I thought of our current EYC Mentor team, especially when Smith says in the episode, "If you want to have a big impact on the kingdom, you need others alongside you."

Looking to Ephesians chapter 4, Smith emphasized that ministry is about equipping – equipping others to be the Body of Christ, growing in faith, growing in knowledge of Christ, and "attaining the whole measure of the fullness of Christ." Without this, no ministry (youth or otherwise) is going to go very far. (I remember elsewhere on the podcast, host Jody Livingston said "you can do student ministry without Jesus for about 2 years." That's roughly the time limit.)


> So how do you do youth ministry with Jesus? Smith basically says two things: slow down and get buy-in, and cast a vision. Sure, that may seem vague. This also isn't going to look the same everywhere. But I believe in St. Mark's EYC, we have begun to get very serious about these two things. We have had great fellowship. We also have had a growing sense of vision and purpose (which isn't necessarily a slogan or tagline that we have to come up with, but something felt and believed by all who are involved).

Smith closed out the interview by saying that youth ministries that believe in this *will* make the time

and they *will* figure out how. "We've got to go New Testament... it's not complicated but it's hard work with lots of prayer." *Fr. Drew*+


